A WORD FROM THE OUTGOING CHAIR

Dear Food Bank Family,

2023 was one for the record books here at the Cupboard! Not only was it our 50th Anniversary of serving the community, we also distributed 44% more food to 24% more individuals than in 2022.

The numbers for last year are here in the report, but I want to mention the 4,480 clients (Families) registered with PCCFB at the close of December of 2023. Those clients represent 10,498 people who benefitted from the food we supply.

None of this could have been accomplished without our generous partners, donors, founding churches, staff and of course our hard-working dedicated volunteers. We thank you all from the bottom of our hearts for your dedication and commitment to our Mission and Vision.

As we start the new year we will have 3 new board members, plus a new Chairperson and Vice-Chair to lead the Cupboard forward.

It has been my honor to serve as Chairperson for the last 2 years and to work with all the PCCFB's staff, volunteers, partners, grantors and donors. Thank you for helping us to help our community.

GOALS FROM 2022 WERE MET ACHIEVEMENTS IN 2023

OPERATIONS & FACILITIES

• The Walk-in Cooler was restored and is operational Heavy Duty Shelving has been added. The project was generously funded by grants from Arizona Community Foundation of Yavapai County and The United Way of Yavapai County.

Much needed extensive repairs to the building's West wall were completed.

• We purchased 6 new correctly sized shopping carts that work well for our clients in our small lobby. Stockroom improvements were made to accommodate our new partnership with St. Mary's Food Bank.

 PCCFB upgraded our outdated computer systems with a new server and workstations in preparation for new software for security and client tracking.

 We now have a dedicated phone to reach the Warehouse Manager and Operations Supervisors during business hours directly for Volunteer and Vendors.

We expanded our staff to 2 Managers, 2 Operations Supervisors and 2 Warehouse Assistants and recruited volunteers
to work with the Warehouse team.

SAFETY IMPROVEMENT

 Northland Cares donated NARCAN to Cupboard in the event of a drug overdose on site. This was just the first step in an overall safety plan to be implemented in 2023.

We moved and rewired our outside security lights to function better and protect the building.

• Through a generous grant from The Dell E Webb Foundation for safety and security we have updated safety equipment at the Cupboard to include additional Fire Extinguishers, a Professional First Aid Kit, an Eye Wash Station, and an AED. We are also installing a new secure door entry system and full security system with their help. Our staff is also being trained in all the safety procedures including how to use the AED.

RELATIONSHIP EXPANSION & NEW DEVELOPMENT

- NEW: We began a vendor relationship with SYSCO Foods for regular weekly delivery of dairy and other foods. They
 are generously negotiating prices with us because of our Non-Profit Status. SYSCO now delivers to us weekly greatly
 helping our local food requirements.
- NEW: St. Mary's approved our application and inspected our site to become our partner. They stated we would be the MODEL food bank for order and cleanliness they would site as an example to other food banks! Yay for us! We are now a purchasing partner with Feeding America through St. Mary's and saving a great amount of money on several of the staples we used to buy at the retail price. St. Mary's now delivers to us weekly helping how much we must haul in locally.
- NEW: We have partnered with Manzanita Outreach, and they provided large amounts of locally grown produce supporting small local farms and our clients.
- Due to our staff always being on time, polite, grateful, honoring commitments and being easy to work with, we are now receiving food donaons 7 DAYS A WEEK from Frys and Safeway combined. This has led to a significant increase of fresh food for our clients
- The Prescott Famers Market is now donating fresh food in the mornings and at the end of the market each Saturday.

We have expanded capacity as we continue to work with The Prescott Markets Compost Program.

• Feeding minds as well as bodies, we continue to work with Prescott Public Library's "Book Nooks" program. A volunteer visits the Book Nooks monthly to restock books. All books bear a bookplate that indicates the book is provided through The Friends of the Prescott Public Library and invites people to visit Prescott Public Library for more good reading.

DONOR & GRANT SUPPORT GROWTH

PCCFB was the beneficiary of numerous grants for specific projects and initiatives, with an increase in 2023 over 2022
in both monetary value and number of grantors providing support.

• Cash and food donations both were up in 2023, as well as the number of donors and average donation amounts.

 The number of food drives conducted benefitting PCCFB rose tremendously in 2023. Hosted by our founding churches, plus new churches, businesses, groups, neighborhoods and organizations, all made a significant impact with their generous donations of food, time and hard work.

A LOOK BACK AT WHAT WE FACED IN 2023 SERVING OUR COMMUNITY'S PEOPLE

Food insecurity continues to be a major problem for middle and low-income workers and families with children, as well as seniors living on fixed incomes.

- Population growth 1.16% for Yavapai County for 2023; a slight reduction in the growth rate from 2022.
- The county poverty level was 12.5%, down just a little from 2022 and .1% less than the national average of 12.6%. Food insecurity in Yavapai County continues to climb, however, and remains substantial.

The PCCFB saw firsthand the ongoing, increasing need for food assistance among Yavapai County's individuals and families.

In 2023 the PCCFB gave out 15,840 bags of food and served 35,916 Individuals - a 24% INCREASE over 2022. That amounted to a total of 415.048 pounds of food, an INCREASE of 44% over 2022.

We had 2,993 registered clients (families) in December of 2022. We ended 2023 with 4,480 registered clients (families) in December of 2023 - a 49.7% INCREASE over 2022. Those 4,480 registered clients (families) represent 10,498 people who benefit from the food we supply, week by week, month by month.

WHAT KIND OF FOOD INSECURITY ARE WE SEEING?

Sometimes, it's difficult for people to understand how food insecurity happens. It most often occurs when physical, social or economic circumstances disrupt a person's access to sufficient quantities of nutritious food to remain healthy.

Food insecurity also occurs when a person has enough food in quantity, but it does not contain the *quality of nutrition* needed for a healthy life.



Chronic Food Insecurity

Chronic food insecurity is a persistent or long-term problem where people are unable to meet their minimum food requirements. This often results from extended periods of poverty, lack of personal assets, and decreased access to financial resources.



Transitory Food Insecurity

Transitory food insecurity is a temporary or short-term problem. It happens when there is a cyclical pattern of insufficient access to food, as a sudden drop in the availability of produce or access to enough food in order to maintain good nutritional status.



Seasonal Food Insecurity

The concept of seasonal food security falls between chronic and transitory food insecurity. As seasonal food insecurity is of limited duration, it can also be seen as recurrent, transitory food insecurity. It occurs when there is a cyclical pattern of inadequate availability and access to food. This is associated with seasonal fluctuations in the farming, as well as job/work opportunities which affect

AN IMPORTANT ECONOMIC FACTOR THAT IMPACTS NEED. .



Just one of many economic factors that contributes to the rise in food insecurity, is the rising cost of food.

In 2022, food prices increased by 9.9 percent, faster than any year since 1979. Food-at-home prices increased by 11.4 percent, while food-away-from-home prices increased by 7.7 percent.

In 2023, food-at-home prices increased by 5.0 percent, and food-away-fromhome prices increased by 7.1 percent.

While food price growth *slowed* in 2023, bottom-line grocery expenses still rose, contributing significantly to even MORE food insecurity.
